Know your home.

In case of an emergency, you will need to know where everything is! Make sure to locate where your fuse box, gas valve, and water valve are. Take a look around your house and double-check to be sure everything is working: outlets, switches, and fixtures. And don't forget to set your appliance's clocks.



Fort Bend MUD 251-INDIGO: BEST TRASH is your trash and recycling collection provider.

TRASH COLLECTION DAYS ARE EVERY MONDAY AND THURSDAY.

RECYCLE COLLECTION DAY EVERY THURSDAY.

GARBAGE COLLECTION: 65-gallon BEST TRASH provided trash carts (black container with red lid)

RECYCLE COLLECTION: 48-gallon BEST TRASH provided recycle carts (green container)

Please have trash and recyclables out to the curb by 7:00 am.

TRASH COLLECTION

On each regularly scheduled collection day, Best Trash will collect residential refuse located at the alleyway in the Best Trash provided trash cart. Residents are restricted to one Best Trash cart for refuse and are encouraged to confine refuse to the cart, however additional refuse may be placed in containers between 30-50 gallons or bags not weighing over 40 pounds, placed next to the Best Trash provided trash cart. Trash carts must be set out by 7 am on the day of collection. For homes with garages on alleys, carts should be places on your driveway at the edge of the alley. For homes with garages on streets, your cart should be placed at the curb.

COTTAGES

On each regularly scheduled collection day, Best Trash will collect residential refuse located in the enclosures. Residents are restricted to one Best Trash cart for refuse and are encouraged to confine refuse to the cart, however additional refuse may be placed in containers between 30-50 gallons or bags not weighing over 40 pounds, placed next to the Best Trash provided trash cart. For cottages, your cart will be collected from your trash enclosure on 7 am on the day of collection.

BILLING

Trash service for Indigo Community is arranged by Fort Bend Municipal Utility District No. 251. If you have any questions related to billing of services, please contact Si Environmental, the District operator at 832-490-1600 Monday through Friday 8 am-5 pm.

EXCLUDED ITEMS

Dirt, sod, mulch, rocks, bricks, tile, concrete, tires, batteries, motor oil, cooking oil, sheetrock, insulation, construction debris, waste generated by a private contractor, or any materials or items deemed hazardous materials. Please do not dispose of gasoline, motor oil, paints, cooking oil, or any other liquid items in a container that are not visible to Best Trash personnel. If such items result in spillage that causes a stain, Best Trash is not responsible for the cleanup. Best Trash will leave a tag explaining the reason for any non-collected item(s).



HEAVY TRASH

Offered every collection day. Items such as appliances, furniture, mattresses will be collected on both service days, the limit is 2 large items per collection day. Carpet (up to 1 room of carpet, cut less than 4 feet wide, tied in bundles not exceeding 40 pounds), will be picked up on both garbage collection days. By Federal Law, refrigerators, freezers, and any other items containing Freon must be drained of Freon and have an accompanying bill to validate such service was performed.

SPECIAL COLLECTION SERVICE

For more than normal amounts of residential refuse, yard trimmings or bulk items, Best Trash does have the ability to provide a special collection service. For pricing information, please email your district name, address, and several pictures of your items to customerservice@besttrashtexas.com.

RECYCLABLE ITEMS

PAPER (including cardboard), PLASTICS (1-5,7), ALUMINUM and TIN cans and GLASS (all colors)

Best Trash takes great pride in our recycle program. Ensuring the best recycle program for our customers takes time and effort on both sides. Please remove caps, liquids and food products from inside the containers. Please only use the provided recycle cart for recyclable materials. The green recycle cart is **NOT** an extra trash container and will **NOT** be emptied as such. If items exceed container capacity, please place them adjacent to the cart well marked as recyclable materials. Cardboard is recyclable, please break down all boxes flat, and place them next to the recycle container for collection.

CART CARE & MAINTENANCE

Best Trash will provide each current residence with ONE 65-gallon trash cart and ONE 48-gallon recycling cart. Best Trash will replace any containers that are defective or otherwise become unusable due to normal wear and tear. Lost or stolen containers can be replaced for a fee by calling Best Trash or emailing customerservice@besttrashtexas.com.

HOLIDAY SCHEDULE

If your regular trash or recycle collection day falls on a holiday (New Years Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, or Christmas Day) the collection will be made on the next regularly scheduled collection day.



The Filling Station

The Filling Station, inspired by 1930s gas stations and the classic general store, will be the first retail offering at Indigo Commons, and includes a general store and café with plenty of relaxed indoor and outdoor seating, and a bar serving craft coffee in the mornings and wine and beer in the evenings.

Indigo Commons

People want places to walk, to connect with others, and to enjoy a casual eatery right in their community. Indigo Commons will be home to local merchants, places to eat, and includes a large community plaza for hosting events, markets, live music, and more. Because of our intimate scale, most of the homes in Indigo will be within a ¼ mile walk of Indigo Commons.

Indigo Farm

Indigo has set aside 42 acres dedicated to sustainable agriculture, which welcomes residents to get involved and engage in many ways and anchors the main entrance to the community off Harlem Road. Indigo Farm will grow diversified seasonal vegetables year-round and have a livestock pasture that will include chickens and other animals, with resident hens producing fresh eggs. Farmers will host the Full Bellied Farm Club, offer farm tours, and many volunteer opportunities. Farm Stand produce and eggs will be available for purchase by residents at The Filling Station, and there will be regular opportunities for farm-to-table dinners and other events.

Indigo Lake

This 25-acre lake will preserve and nurture the natural habitats for shorebirds and freshwater fish. Indigo residents will have full access to the dock, as well as the ability to check out community kayaks and paddle the lake—which is large enough to explore and learn about the natural habitat, or just unplug and decompress. The natural lake edge will be circled by a trail to walk or jog, and enjoy the peaceful waters and sounds of the birds. A place to get away from it all, right inside the community.







EV Envoy Car Share

As a resident in Indigo, you will have access to a Rivian R1T available to book via the Envoy Mobility app. A luxury EV truck for moving small items, picking up plants, furniture, or other items. Our hope is this will inspire some residents in Indigo to give up the environmental and financial cost of a second car, which some estimates put at \$12,000 a year. All residents will enjoy some complimentary time with this EV on move-in.*



Common Homeowner Tips

Home maintenance

Your new home tends to be in good shape when you move in. However, if you do not do regular maintenance on your home, the condition of your home could deteriorate. Home maintenance tasks can include cleaning gutters, power washing the house, preparing for seasonal changes, etc.

Budgeting for additional expenses

There are additional fees that you need to be aware of in addition to your monthly mortgage. Some of those fees include, but are not limited to, the following:

- · HOA fees
- · Home care tools
- · Homeowner's insurance
- Property taxes (expected to be 2.9281%)
- Utilities

HOMEOWNER

Responsibilities

This information is supplemental to the Declaration of Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions (CCRs) for the Indigo Residential Community. If any information below contradicts the CCRs, the official CCRs will offer the most up-to-date information.

HOMEOWNER RESPONSIBILITIES AT INDIGO

As a resident of Indigo, you play a vital role in maintaining the beauty and functionality of your home and its surroundings. Here's what you need to know:

Landscaped Alleys

You're responsible for maintaining the landscaped portions of alleys that are adjacent to your lot. For a visual reference, see Exhibit D in the Indigo Residential Declaration of CCRs.

Fencing

Except for fencing maintained by the Association (see Exhibit C of the CCRs), you're responsible for the care and upkeep of fencing located on your property.

Lawn & Plant Care

Unless your home falls under the Townhome Maintenance Obligations or you own a Cottage home, all aspects of lawn and plant maintenance-including irrigation, pruning, and replacement-are your responsibility. (See page 19 of the CCRs.)

Trees and Shrubs

Unless you own a Cottage home or townhome, trimming, removal, and replacement of trees and shrubs located on your lot are your responsibility. Please see architectural guidelines for information regarding required landscaping elements.

Retaining Walls

Maintaining the integrity of retaining walls on your property is essential to the safety and appearance of your landscape.

Driveways and Walkways

You're responsible for the maintenance of driveways and walkways on your lot, except for shared driveways and sidewalks maintained by the Association. Refer to the CCRs for specific details.

Easement Areas

Any easement areas on your lot must be maintained according to Indigo's community guidelines.

Home Exteriors

All exterior components of your residence should be kept in good condition and align with Indigo's design standards.

Home Interiors and Personal Property

The interior of your home and any personal property are fully your responsibility.

Lot Improvements

You're responsible for maintaining any improvements on your lot unless otherwise covered under Townhome Maintenance Obligations.

Townhome Maintenance Obligations

Townhome owners are responsible for roof attachments, the foundation, and the repair or replacement of exterior doors and windows.

ASSOCIATION

Responsibilities

This information is supplemental to the Declaration of Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions (CCRs) for the Indigo Residential Community. If any information below contradicts the CCRs, the official CCRs will offer the most up-to-date information.

ASSOCIATION RESPONSIBILITIES AT INDIGO

The Indigo Residential Association is committed to maintaining shared community elements to ensure a cohesive and beautiful neighborhood:

Common Areas

The Association maintains all common areas and the landscaping and structures within them.

Roads and Driveways

Private drives, driveways, roads, and rights-of-way not included in the Property Roads are maintained by the Association and/or the MUD depending on location.

Association-Maintained Fencing

As shown in Exhibit C of the CCRs, the Association maintains fencing in easement areas and common areas.

Indigo Cottages Landscaping

All landscaping in the Indigo Cottages area is maintained by the Association to ensure a lush, well-kept environment.

Townhome Maintenance Obligations

The Association maintains the roofs of Townhomes, including shingles, flashing, pipes and penetrations, structural framing, and gutters. The Association also maintains the exterior façade and may paint window trim and exterior doors at the Board's discretion. Front and rear yard landscaping and irrigation systems for Townhomes are also maintained by the Association.



Help your neighborhood maintain its character

Before you being any exterior modifications to your home (architectural, landscape, paint, etc.), you must obtain approval from the Architectural Control Committee.

Let's face it, we all have different tastes and styles. The design review process provides consistency in the quality of all exterior home modifications, emphasizes the natural characteristics of the area, and supports the community vision.

Before you submit your application

- 1. Review the official Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions document, as well as the Rules and Regulations first, even if your vendor feels confident they know them. Then contact the Community Life Team if you still have questions. Reviewing these documents will give you more realistic expectations when working with your vendor. Even if your modification meets the guidelines, you still need review and approval from the Architectural Control Committee before you begin any work.
- 2. Don't assume you can make a modification just because someone else did. You may have noticed your neighbor made an exterior modification, but that doesn't mean it was approved, nor that it will work for your home.
- 3. Plan a realistic timeline with your vendor. The Architectural Control Committee typically meets bi-weekly and has 30 days from the date a completed application is submitted to review and provide a written response to the homeowner. Complete, clear, and thorough applications may be returned much sooner.
- 4. Don't start any work until you've obtained approval from the committee. It's much easier to go through the design review process before you make a modification than to have to remove the modification at your own expense.

6+ month leases

Per the IRCA Rules and Regulations (see page 15), only 20% of homes in Indigo can be leased at any given time, and leases cannot be shorter than six months. Homeowners must submit a residential lease request and obtain IRCA permission before they rent out their home. You may obtain the form at indigoresidents.org/resales.

Short-term rentals (Cottages only)

Only Cottages located in the neighborhood immediately adjacent to the commercial property may be permitted to have short-term leases; homeowners must submit a short term rental request and receive Cottage RBO status from the IRCA before they can begin renting their home. Review the IRCA Rules and Regulations (see page 15) for full details on what's allowed and what's prohibited. You may obtain the form at indigoresidents.org/resales.

Cottages in the first phase of the Indigo community are permitted to have short-term leases. Please email **indigo@coherelife.com** to confirm if your cottage is available for short term rental.
